Shave biopsy of skin lesion

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What is shave biopsy?

This is a method of removing a lump from your skin that has risen above the skin surface.

Why do I need this?

To make a diagnosis and remove the majority of the lesion. The skin will be sent to the pathology laboratory and examined under a microscope to aid diagnosis.

Are there any alternatives?

Depending on the diagnosis and the site affected, the dermatologist may consider alternative treatments. These may include freezing with liquid nitrogen or a bigger surgical procedure known as excisional biopsy.

How do I prepare for it?

You do not need any special preparation. You can eat and drink normally before the procedure.

What does the operation involve?

- 1. The procedure is performed under local anaesthesia.
- 2. The anaesthetic is injected around the lesion to numb it.
- 3. A sharp instrument known as a blade/scalpel is used to shave the lesion level with the surrounding skin and the sample that has been removed is sent to the laboratory.
- 4. The wound may need to be cauterised (heat-sealed) to stop any bleeding. The wound may take a few weeks to heal completely.

Are there any risks or complications?

As with all procedures, there are some risks from having this operation:

- **Bleeding** this will normally be controlled during the procedure.
- Infection see your GP if concerned.
- **Delayed healing** see your GP if concerned.
- **Scarring** the area heals like a graze, leaving a scar which is usually flat, although sometimes scarring can be unpredictable or unsightly.
- **Recurrence of lesion** if the growth has not been completely removed, there is a small chance it will grow back in the future.
- **Need for further procedure** your dermatologist will inform you of the results and whether further surgery is needed.

Will I have any pain or discomfort?

The local anaesthetic injection does cause a temporary stinging sensation. You may have some discomfort after the operation. Simple painkillers such as paracetamol and ibuprofen may be used if necessary.

What happens afterwards?

Following your shave biopsy you will be given instructions about looking after your wound at home.

What should I look out for?

- The wound might become infected if it becomes red and sore, please see your GP.
- Bleeding if this occurs some hours after the procedure, firm pressure for 10 mins should stop the bleeding. You will be given advice about this before you leave.
- If the scar is raised initially, firm massage to the area is recommended.

When will I get my results?

The dermatologist will send the results to you and your GP. This can take up to four weeks.

Will I need any follow up?

This will be arranged by the dermatologist if required.
